Answer: February 2017

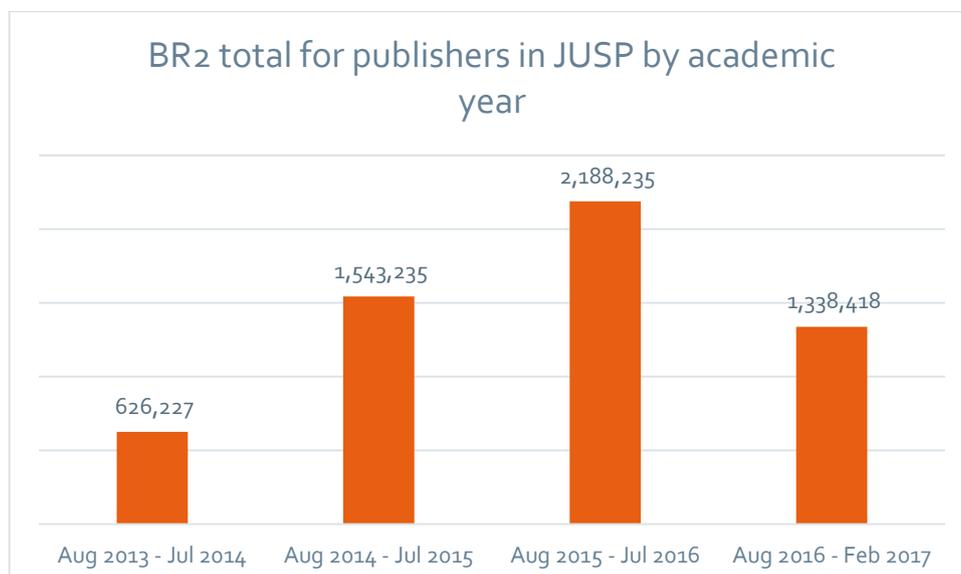
3. Where would you go to check for any harvesting issues with these publishers?

9. What do you noticed about the titles appearing in both lists? Why would you need to consider resource type when comparing section requests?

Answer: They are all large reference works such as dictionaries, encyclopedias and reference modules. A section for a dictionary will most likely be an entry for a single word, whereas other types of resource may be counting chapters. As these are also large publications, it is likely that they would to be referred to more frequently than say a textbook.
