Deciding whether JUSP is right for your institution

To help you decide if JUSP (Journal Usage Statistics Portal) is right for your institution we have created a simple assessment tool. Decide whether each statement applies to you and then see whether JUSP can help you.

Usage data is an essential part of JUSP, and so it is important to first check that we can collect usage data for you.

Are your digital resources covered by JUSP?	Yes/No	Can JUSP help?
<p>We have a number of journal subscriptions with publishers listed as supplying COUNTER-compliant journal reports* on the participants page http://jusp.jisc.ac.uk/participants/</p> <p>*COUNTER is standard for counting usage. JUSP gather Journal Report 1 (JR1) for full-text requests, JR1a for requests from an archive, JR1GOA for requests of Gold Open Access articles, JR2 for access denials, and JR5 for request by year of publication.</p>		
<p>We have a number of books hosted with publishers listed as supplying COUNTER-compliant book reports** on the participants page http://jusp.jisc.ac.uk/participants/</p> <p>** Book Report 1 (BR1) and Book Report 2 (BR2) are COUNTER standard reports that count book usage, and the Book Report 3 (BR3) counts access denied.</p>		
<p>We have a number of bibliographic or image databases (e.g. Web of Science, The Burney Collection, Primal Pictures, MEDLINE, Academic Search etc)</p>		

Can we collect usage data for you? Great! Now find out how JUSP can help you. If you answer "yes" to any of the following, this would indicate JUSP will be useful to you.

<p>We want a picture of usage through both publishers and intermediaries (e.g. EBSCOhost and IngentaConnect)</p>

We need to report usage data to others and monitor trends in usage over a number of years		✓
We want to be able to report on usage of our resources quickly and easily		✓

We need to be able to export usage data into other applications, e.g. spreadsheets (Excel), library or electronic resource management systems or usage statistics tool (UStat, EBSCO Consolidation etc.)		✓

JUSP is relatively quick and easy to set up. After signing the agreement via Jisc Collections, we will request some details from you and the publishers. We then gather historical usage data back several years (this varies from publisher to publisher depending on availability), and you can start to run reports as soon as data have been added.
