JUSP at UKSG

Members of the JUSP team attended the UKSG Conference in Bournemouth in April. In addition to attending some really interesting keynotes and breakout sessions, Jo Lambert and Jo Alcock hosted a breakout session which included JUSP alongside other library analytics tools such as IRUS-UK. JUSP Community Advisory Group member Graham Stone (University of Huddersfield) joined them for the session titled, “Help me data! How library analytics tools can help you in your role”. The session gave an overview of library analytics tools, and shared examples of how they are being used. Examples which used JUSP included:

- Aston University’s research into whether implementation of a discovery service impacted use of their journals
- University of Huddersfield’s assessment of the 2016 Taylor and Francis offer
- University of Huddersfield’s investigations into GOA use

No data from old Maney platform for February 2016

T&F took over Maney last year and dual hosted content until end of Feb 2016.

Maney's servers were switched off end of February, so unfortunately we were not able to gather JR1 data for this month. T&F have confirmed that that they also cannot supply JR1 reports for the Maney platform.

Usage for Maney titles via the T&F platform are available, but there are no data via the old Maney platform for February 2016.
