



## The Journal Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP)

The Journal Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP) is a Jisc-funded service that provides a “one-stop shop” for libraries to view, download and analyse their journal usage reports from multiple publishers. It responds to current financial challenges with time and cost saving benefits.

### JUSP and KB+ interoperability

#### Core titles

The JUSP and KB+ teams recently held a development meeting to discuss ways in which the two systems can interoperate and produce cost and time saving benefits for the community. Over the next few months, we will be exploring ways to rationalise the core title functionality that each system offers, share data between the two systems, and produce a centrally-held core title list editable from both KB+ and JUSP. We are also working closely on a range of related developments.

#### More 2014 title lists added to JUSP

KB+ has also done a great deal of work in producing authoritative, KBART-compliant title lists for a huge range of deals offered by publishers. JUSP is now using these to populate its own store of title lists which allow users to view the usage of the subscribed deal or package taken against all titles included in the publisher's JR1 report. We have added around 80 of this year's title lists to JUSP during June, to complement others added throughout the year to date. This is another example of the way JUSP and KB+ are working closely together to the benefit of the community, and also to save a huge amount of time as these lists no longer need to be independently created by the JUSP development team.

### JUSP and publishers

We are pleased to welcome Wolters Kluwer Health (Medical Research) Ltd who joined JUSP in June. We are working with colleagues to implement SUSHI harvesting. We are also currently working with colleagues at EBSCO Information Services and hope to make your data available in JUSP shortly.
