



## The Journal Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP)

The Journal Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP) is a Jisc-funded service that provides a “one-stop shop” for libraries to view, download and analyse their journal usage reports from multiple publishers. It responds to current financial challenges with time and cost saving benefits.

### Update on COUNTER release 4 implementation

COUNTER release 4 has now been implemented by 40 JUSP participants (listed below) with others expected to follow shortly. Approximately 30 of these provide the new Gold Open Access (JR1 GOA) report.

For release 4, the JR1a report: Number of Successful Full-Text Requests from an Archive by Month and Journal is now an optional usage report, as a capability to provide Journal Report 5 is now required for all vendors that sell separately purchasable journal archives. Some publishers, eg Elsevier, are no longer providing the JR1a report.

Also, please note that some publishers are now excluding titles where there is zero usage from their JR1, JR1a and JR1 GOA reports.

### JR5 reports

The JUSP team are exploring the possibility of including the JR5 report in JUSP now that it is a standard report in COUNTER release 4.

Some publishers have been producing JR5 reports for some time so we are hoping that some of you already have experience of using this report. While we are working on the technical implications, it would be helpful to know from any of you who are using the JR5, how you use it, what you like about it, and how you would see it fitting with the existing reports you get from JUSP.

## Publisher wish list survey

The JUSP team have created a rolling publisher ‘wish list’ on Survey Monkey for JUSP institutions, as our work with publishers is informed by our users. This rolling survey offers institutions a mechanism to suggest potential JUSP publishers and to provide publisher contact details, where available, at any time throughout the year. This feedback will prove invaluable to keep our ‘publisher wish list’ fresh and current, whilst also providing valuable contact details, which may be unknown to us.
