## Farewell to Lorraine Estelle

The JUSP team want to say a big thank you to Lorraine Estelle, who left Jisc recently to take up a new appointment as COUNTER Project Director. Lorraine has been key to the development of JUSP after initially commissioning a study for Jisc Collections on the value and usage of NESLi2 deals back in 2005. One of the main recommendations of this work, that there should be a statistics portal to provide a single point of access to usage data for e-resource librarians, ultimately resulted in JUSP. In the early days of COUNTER the standard wasn't widely adopted but Lorraine was a driving force in ensuring the recommendations of the report were implemented. JUSP has since developed from an early prototype in 2008 to a service that's now used by virtually every university and research council library in the UK.

Lorraine's enthusiasm, commitment and expertise has helped to steer JUSP's development over the years. She has been a great supporter of JUSP and will no doubt continue to do so in her new post. The team wish her all the best in her new role at COUNTER.

## New libraries

## Ebooks update

The ebook project is progressing well, and we have started to harvest and ingest some initial ebook usage statistics to begin testing.

We are currently trialling ebook usage data collection from a number of publishers and aggregators.

Our group of test libraries have shared some information about how they currently use ebook usage statistics, the issues that they encounter, and what they would like to see in the JUSP ebooks service. They are in agreement that they essentially want a similar service to that provided by JUSP for journals, i.e. the basic COUNTER reports from both publishers and aggregators all available in one place with a single login; time saved on data collection which can be spent on data analysis; and the ability to run other reports and overviews, e.g. trends over time.

We will soon be sharing data with the test libraries to get feedback to help us develop the reports further.

We'll continue to share updates in future JUSP newsletters.

## JUSP priorities for 2015-2016

We are currently looking at priorities for development of the JUSP service during the coming year.

We will be referring to information and ideas gathered from various sources including our recent community survey
