



## The Jisc Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP)

The Jisc Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP) is a Jisc-funded service that provides a “one-stop shop” for libraries to view, download and analyse their journal and book usage reports from multiple publishers.

### SCONUL returns 2015/16

All journal data for publishers in JUSP have been collected up to July 2016. Data for the 11 book publishers we currently have in JUSP are also up to date.

Note that JUSP is not able to supply complete usage for EBSCOhost, IngentaConnect or Highwire, and we only show usage for JUSP participating publishers for these platforms.

### Interested in contributing to JUSP Case Studies? We want to hear from you!

We are keen to produce case studies that demonstrate how libraries are using JUSP data for particular tasks. If you are using JUSP for any of the following purposes it would be great to hear from you:

- **Supporting purchasing and renewal decisions:** looking at how data from JUSP is used and how it is combined with other information to support purchasing and renewal decisions
- **Evaluating the effectiveness of discovery systems:** looking at how institutions are using JUSP data to evaluate the effectiveness of discovery systems.
- **Usage profiling:** looking at how institutions are using the usage profiling functionality in JUSP

Case studies will be written up and presented on the JUSP website and shared with the JUSP community to demonstrate ways in which JUSP can be used to provide value. It could also provide a good opportunity to promote what your organisation is doing.

It is expected that providing case study data will not be an onerous task. We are keen to hear about anything that has proven useful in practice for your institution in some way. So it might include something that is done as regular practice or something that was done for a specific one time purpose. It could be something that has been done on a large or small scale.

We have also had a lot of interest in a workshop aimed at more experienced users of JUSP, and so we are also pleased to offer another workshop in Manchester in June.

## What is the JR5?

The JR5 report shows you the number of monthly requests for each title and year of publication directly from a selected publisher over a selected period of time. It includes the same usage counts as the JR1 but breaks this down by year of publication. This allows you evaluate different type of journal subscriptions and packages such as current, front file, rolling walls, free and purchased backfiles.

## Cambridge Core

As many of you will be aware, Cambridge University Press launched a new platform, Cambridge Core, which brings together book and journal content on one platform. We have collected and loaded journal data for August from the old platform, so there will be no gap in usage. With the move to the new platform, CUP will start supply COUNTER Release 4 reports, and we hope to make additional CUP reports (JR2, JR5, BR2 and BR3) available in JUSP in due course.
