

## JUSP USE INFORMING DECISIONS CASE FOR SUBSTITUTIONS



In order to offer value for money, libraries are keen to ensure they make the right purchasing decisions on behalf of their users so that the collection continues to reflect the teaching and research needs of the institution. A number of publishers allow libraries to make some alterations to the core or subscribed titles held within their collections, and most libraries review their packages on an annual basis. It can be difficult to ensure the right decisions are made based on the needs of the organisation's users.

### How can JUSP help?

In addition to providing accurate, up-to-date information on the overall usage of their resources, JUSP has a number of special reports that enable libraries to identify which resources are being most heavily used. One table shows the top 100 titles accessed over a certain time period across all publishers, another enables libraries to track usage of a particular title or group of titles over a three year period. With the current JUSP enhancements work, libraries can mark up the core or subscribed titles they hold within a collection and see these as starred items within all their JUSP reports. By using this information, they can see which core or subscribed titles are being heavily used, and which are not, helping them make decisions about which titles to consider substituting or cancelling. At the same time, JUSP will show which previously unsubscribed titles within a collection are now getting heavy use.

Using this method to manage electronic journals ensures an evidence-based approach to collection management decision making is taken. The information gathered from JUSP will help libraries in their discussions with academic departments on resource allocation and management, and will give a clearer picture of the institution's changing teaching and research profiles.

### What do JUSP institutions say?

*JUSP is really useful for making decisions for cancellations (or substitutions if publishers allow) – we have used this with Elsevier and plan to in future with other suppliers.*
