

The Journal Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP)

The Journal Usage Statistics Portal (JUSP) provides a “one-stop shop” for libraries to view, download and analyse their usage reports from NESLi2 publishers <http://www.jisc-collections.ac.uk/nesli2/>. It responds to current financial challenges with time and cost saving benefits.

Publishers and JUSP

We would like to welcome Nature Publishing Group and Springer as the latest publishers to sign up to JUSP. Other publishers and intermediaries currently involved in the project include Oxford University Press, Swets, American Institute of Physics (AIP) and Project MUSE/The Johns Hopkins University Press.

Publishers were invited to attend a JUSP event held in London on 24th November 2010. The forum was intended to introduce publishers to the benefits of participating in JUSP, via a presentation, demonstration and Q&A session. The event was very successful with twelve publishers attending. There was a lot of interest in JUSP and a very positive approach to working together for the benefit of libraries.

JUSP Survey

Libraries participating in JUSP were asked to complete a survey during November and December about their experiences of using the portal. The feedback has provided some useful ideas and will be essential in helping develop JUSP further during 2011. We'll provide details of the survey results in January and outline the work we're doing to respond to feedback. We've already implemented some minor changes including an export function for the SCONUL report, more report sort options such as a facility to sort on zero usage, and more detailed information in the FAQ.

New Usage Report

We've recently added a new usage report to JUSP. The report enables libraries to perform a keyword search to view journals that the institution subscribes to, and then select titles to view usage. Please take a look and let us know what you think of this.

Standardized Usage Statistics Harvesting Initiative (SUSHI)

Apart from Oxford University Press, usage statistics are now being gathered via SUSHI for Springer and Project MUSE/The Johns Hopkins University Press. We will shortly be collecting usage data via SUSHI for American Institute of Physics (AIP) and will circulate an announcement once this is available. We're in discussions with a number of publishers to implement SUSHI and will continue to extend this form of data collection to include others over the coming months.
